Details:

Mr. Summy was the third husband of Earlene Wooddell Douglas (ne' Sheets). They were married at the Victoria Wedding Chapel in Carson City, Nevada on November 4, 1993. Ms. Douglas filed for divorce in Douglas County, Nevada in 1998, according to Mr. Summy. He has been employed by Truckee Meadows Water Authority for nearly 30 years. He is a water supply specialist.

I interviewed Mr. Summy telephonically on July 6th and July 18th of 2005, wherein he provided the following information regarding their marriage and Ms. Douglas' background, behavior and personality.

He described Ms. Douglas as a wicked person, manipulative, controlling, violent and high maintenance. He also called her a "black widow." He asserted that she is very vindictive, hateful and vengeful. He added that as a former parole officer she knows every police officer and judge in town and has and will threaten to use those connections to intimidate people to get what she wants.

Mr. Summy described an incident whereby Ms. Douglas threatened his tax preparer at Jackson Hewitt during their divorce to provide his confidential financial details. She flashed her credentials and intimated that if the woman did not cooperate she would come under law enforcement scrutiny. Mr. Summy learned of these details when his tax preparer contacted him immediately after the incident.

In describing her controlling behavior, he provided that she had to know everything that he was doing and described that on occasion she followed him to keep tabs on his whereabouts. He spoke of several incidents whereby Ms. Douglas would appear at various jobsites, as if by accident. She would indicate that she was in the neighborhood checking up on a parolee when it was clear she had been following him because his location could not be observed from passing by.

She would also spontaneously bring up the names of places he had visited during the day under a guise to see if he would admit to knowing about the businesses or that he had been there that particular day. For example, one day he went to the European Spa to exercise, as he did on occasion. Later that evening, Ms. Douglas brought up the Spa and curiously asked what kind of place it was and wondered what people did there. She was trying to see if he would admit to going there that day as she had most likely followed him there, but Mr. Summy said that instead of taking the bait, he pretended he had no idea about the place.

Although they were living in Reno in 1998 when they separated, Ms. Douglas filed for divorce in Douglas County, Nevada. According to Mr. Summy, she did so because she knew it would cause considerable disruption with his work schedule to have to travel to Minden. He said if there is anything she can do to be disruptive and vindictive she will.

She filed a temporary protective order against Mr. Summy in September 1998 and was granted a 30 day order. Mr. Summy said he had just gotten home from work and made himself a peanut butter and jelly sandwich when he noticed two police cars approaching their house on Marlin Drive in Reno. He said the officers had their guns out of their holsters as they approached the front door. He opened the door to inquire what the problem was. The officers informed him he was being served with a temporary protective order and that he had 30 minutes to grab what he could and leave the property. He contended that he was stunned, but proceeded to pack as much of his belongings into his work vehicle and his personal vehicle. The officers indicated they would let him return to the property to retrieve his personal vehicle but he was not allowed to enter the residence again.

Mr. Summy explained that he went to the bank to withdraw some money before going to a motel but he quickly learned that their joint account had no money in it. He could not even withdraw \$20 to hire a cab to return to the house and retrieve his personal vehicle. He slept in his company truck for two nights before borrowing some money. When he returned to retrieve his vehicle, he found that all his belongings he had loaded were gone and the vehicle would not even start. The battery had been run down probably because the alarm had gone off when the vehicle had been broken into.

Approximately two months later, he received a call from Ms. Douglas informing him that she had found some more of his property. She told him she had put everything in storage and that he could retrieve the key from a friend's house. Upon opening the storage space, he was hit by an intense smell. He said it was as if something had died in there. He found some of his belongings rolled in a dog stained carpet. The carpet had been urinated and defecated on, presumably by her dogs. This was an example of her hateful and vengeful behavior.

During their marriage, he thought she was trying to get pregnant so he had consulted with his doctor about getting a vasectomy. He believed this was the turning point in their relationship going "sideways." He told her and asked her to drive him home after the procedure. She was livid that he had not consulted her. "That proves that you don't love me," she had told him. He argued that he would be too old (born in 1946), he already had two grown children and he did not believe it would be fair to any child to have a father that could not be involved.

He added that she had always tried to drive a wedge in his relationship with his two other grown children because she only wanted him to have a relationship with her and no one else. Mr. Summy reflected on how different his attitude was toward her child, Tamsen Douglas. He said he truly cared for her and did everything he could to develop a great relationship with her and make her happy. He included Tamsen in activities with his own children as a family and indicated that he willingly helped her with her horse training and competitions. He explained that Tamsen was an extremely good barrel racer and that he had been involved and a part of many rodeos in the area. He was a former secretary of the Reno Rodeo for six years. He asserted that he put his life on hold so she could ride in events across Nevada and California. Sadly, he said his relationship with Tamsen was

destroyed by Ms. Douglas during and after the divorce. There was no way Ms. Douglas would have permitted the relationship to continue, he indicated.

Mr. Summy offered that they had been to family counseling during their marriage, but Ms. Douglas became angry at the counselor and ended the sessions, instead finding a UNR psychiatrist for them to see. Mr. Summy contended that she did not like the family counselor because often she was not on her side of the issues. Ms. Douglas could not manipulate the situation and her ultimate goal was to get Mr. Summy diagnosed with bipolar disorder. She had been trying to convince Mr. Summy that he was bipolar and needed medication. He did not believe he had the disorder and was not convinced he was the cause of their marital problems.

At their first meeting with the UNR psychiatrist, Ms. Douglas immediately told the doctor that Mr. Summy wanted to commit suicide. From that point forward, he said she controlled the situation to his detriment. Eventually, he was prescribed Lithium and Prozac for bipolar disorder and his health deteriorated. At one point during the treatment, he became very ill with a dangerous clot in his leg. He said he began to think that Ms. Douglas may have been trying to kill him. He said he told a couple of people, "I think she is trying to kill me." He said she had convinced the doctor that he was really screwed up and needed the medication. He said he continued to visit the psychiatrist, even after the divorce, because he did benefit from his discussions with the doctor. He contended that after the divorce, the doctor told him Ms. Douglas was a "bitch" and that it was the best thing for him that she was out of his life.

Mr. Summy stated that Ms. Douglas wrote the divorce papers with a paralegal that worked for her attorney, Casey Campbell. His attorney was Doug Nicholson. He went to a meeting with Ms. Douglas, the paralegal and Ms. Campbell to look over the paperwork. He stopped at the retirement portion of the agreement when he realized she wanted half of his retirement for the period they had been married. He said both the paralegal and her attorney tried to dissuade her, telling her just to leave it alone or he will get half of yours. She disagreed and tried to get him to sign the paperwork before his attorney could review it. He said the paralegal and Ms. Campbell left during the meeting. He refused to sign and when they got to court, Mr. Nicholson argued that Mr. Summy should get half of her retirement if she was to get his and of course the judge agreed. He said Ms. Douglas was shocked because the proceedings were completed so quickly and she had been wrong.

Ms. Douglas received a lump sum payment of \$20,000.00 from his retirement, but the State of Nevada informed him they do not make lump sum payments, so he receives a check monthly from her retirement account. He said it was probably better this way because each month she gets a reminder that she has to pay him because her desire to screw him backfired. He said she had asked for alimony in the amount of \$1.00 per month and if he missed one payment she could reevaluate the alimony. To thwart her plan, he pre-paid 20 years of alimony.

Mr. Summy had no knowledge of her having any interest in S&M (sodomasochism) or any other unusual sexual behavior. He did say she was attracted to black men. When asked if Ms. Douglas had any other children, Mr. Summy indicated some time ago she had a son by a rich man whose family was in the convenience store and/or grocery business. I brought up the name Chris Gadda and he confirmed that he was the one. He believed it was her first husband.

He said Ms. Douglas had not told him about her son, whose name is Evan Gadda. He stated that he was at Ms. Douglas' mother's house for some kind of a gathering when Evan asked him if he knew who he was and Mr. Summy said he did not. Evan explained that he was her son. Mr. Summy said Evan was not able to care for himself and believed he had multiple sclerosis or a similar disease. He said Evan could not feed himself, go to the bathroom without assistance, bathe, etc.

Evan lived with his grandmother on Arlington Street somewhere near a school, he recalled. He said, one of Ms. Douglas' sisters takes care of him as well as a caretaker that comes in to the house to assist with day to day needs. Ms. Douglas, he indicated, did not care for him. He recalled the sister was a physician and that she worked at a Sun Valley Clinic, but he could not recall her name. Ms. Douglas' other sister, he claimed, does transcription services for doctors. He could not recall her name either.

Mr. Summy had no idea where Ms. Douglas was currently working or if she was dating or married to anyone. The last he knew was she was working as a counselor at the McGee Center, a family resource center for troubled teens located at the corner of South Rock and Longley. He said the center was founded by Washoe District Judge McGee. He presumed she knew Judge McGee from her work as a parole officer.

He was unaware that she had filed for bankruptcy in August 2000 and was surprised because he said she had gotten the \$20,000.00 in their divorce and was "soaking Douglas (John-second husband) for \$500 to \$700 per month for Tamsen."

He said he had not spoken with her in many years and had tossed her number. He thought she had probably gone through at least ten guys since their divorce because he said she tended to move on quickly if the guy was not controllable or she had gotten what she wanted out of him. When I explained that she was dating a wealthy man from Incline Village he was not surprised. He offered that she had always wanted to be part of the "High Society Club." She will try to go after everything she can get, he stated. "She doesn't have any feelings for anyone, except Tamsen," he maintained, so she will do whatever is necessary to gain money, material things or to gain position or promotion. The perfect guy to her is one that "will do what she wants" and has the money to do it.




